2021-2022 ALUMNI ASSOCIATION CAMPAIGN IS UNDERWAY

Representatives of the Marian Catholic High School Alumni Association, including class representatives, kicked off 2022 with a "Zoom" meeting in January, during which time plans for the year were discussed and updates on the current membership campaign were provided.

As has always been the case, our mission remains the same, to promote Marian Catholic High School and its students, and to reconnect our graduates with the school as a means of working together to make sure Marian Catholic continues to be a viable educational option for boys and girls and their parents for years to come.

Our membership campaign starts in the Fall each year and runs consistent with the school year. If you have not yet joined us, please consider doing so.

To date, 310 graduates have opted to join the association, resulting in \$10,580 having been raised for the school. All of the revenue that is generated through the Alumni Association is used for financial assistance. We encourage everyone to

please relay to parents considering their son's or daughter's high school education to "let us show you how a Marian Catholic education is affordable" to them.

We have 53 class representatives representing 37 classes who have graciously volunteered to assist us with helping to locate their class members. After all, we believe classmates know better than anyone else where their classmates are.

The year was 1999 and I started my ninth-grade year in a local public high school. My cousin and best friend at the time attended Marian Catholic. The thought of a smaller school interested me tremendously and I began begging my parents to send me to Marian Catholic.

One day, after begging my parents for what felt like forever, I came home to my mother informing me that I would be starting at Marian Catholic the next day. For how I dealt with anxiety on a daily basis, it was a surprise to not feel anything but anticipation and excitement.

Being a student at Marian Catholic brought me an immediate feeling of love, acceptance, and peace. Everyone was so accepting of others. Jesus was a major focus, having good morals and values were not only taught but expected, and more parents were heavily involved regarding the school career of their children.

The experience was unlike anything I could have ever hoped for. The next few years of school went entirely too fast. Graduation day quickly arrived and I was then considered a 2002 Marian Catholic Alumni.

Having gone to Marian Catholic and now being a mother, I realize how important Catholic education is. My son is currently in kindergarten at St. Jerome's. I could not be happier with the decision I made to send him to a private school. He is not only being delivered a good, quality education but he is being shaped into a good person. As a mother, I couldn't ask for anything better.

Jacque Lavelle didn't exactly follow a straight path towards her professional career, but she had the opportunity to work in as many as five states before landing in Montana.

The 1984 Marian graduate, one of four children of Attorney Marianne (Shutack) Lavelle of Lehigh and the late President Judge John P. Lavelle of the Carbon County Court of Common Pleas, Jacque moved on from Hometown to the University of Rochester in New York and then the University of Virginia, attaining a bachelor of arts degree in history and a master's degree in Urban and Environmental Planning, respectively.

A career with the U.S. National Park Service followed.

"I started working for the National Park Service in the summer of my junior year in college as a Student Conservation Association Resource Assistant," Jacque said.

The program places students in National Parks where they gain experience and work for housing and a stipend.

Her position was in the Prince William Forest Park in Triangle, VA.

Upon graduating, Jacque was hired as a museum technician on a one-year appointment. Later, she continued her pursuits with the Park Service moving to various jobs, including park ranger, wildland fire fighter, education specialist and concession specialist, having worked in Maryland, Utah, Colorado, Arizona and Washington, D.C., before relocating to Montana.

In the "Big Sky" state, Jacque currently serves as superintendent of the Grant-Kohrs Ranch National Historic Site, where duties include leading a team of educators, ranchers and craftsmen who are preserving and telling the story of cowboys in America and sharing heritage skills with the public. She is also a public information officer on a Wildland Fire incident management team.

Jacque looks back on her Marian experience and says, "I was never a great student, but I found a place with the drama club and stage crew. I think this helped me realize my love of the arts and working with creative people."

Marian graduates, she says, who aspire to a career similar to hers, could find many related opportunities. Jacque said, "The National Park Service is a federal government agency and hires through an online system at USAJobs.gov. Pennsylvania is home to 19 National Park units, including Gettysburg, Valley Forge, Independence Hall, and Flight 93."

Jacque is married to Jeff Pinkard for 24 years. He is a retired law enforcement officer with the National Park Service. The couple has two fur babies, Eddie, an orange tabby, and Dixie, a black lab.

Her older brother, John, Class of '81, and younger brother, Jim, Class of '87, are both attorneys while her sister Marianne, Class '77, is a journalist who writes for Inside Climate News, a Pulitzer Prize-winning news organization that provides essential reporting and analysis on climate change, energy and the environment.

MARIAN '79 FOOTBALL TEAM SENIORS GATHER FOR A UNIQUE REUNION

The seniors of the Marian Catholic Colts' 1979 football team had hoped to hold a special 40th anniversary reunion last year, but COVID-19 moved the goal line and caused a delay of game.

The winning Colts team finally got the chance to get together and reminisce about their days on and off the gridiron in October at The Lakeside Ballroom.

There is a bond among classmates that gets renewed when a reunion is held, but when it comes to sports, there is something extra for the players who practiced and played as a band of brothers or sisters.

There were 19 seniors on the Colts' football team in 1979. They played 11 games, ending with a 9-2 record, shutting out Line Mountain, Mahanoy Area and Jim Thorpe, and only losing to Pottsville Area and Panther Valley.

The senior team members included Kory Bates, Peter Bubel, Jeff Butala, Frank Castellana, Brian Cinicola, David Coury, Paul Creedon, Sammy Cusanelli, Tony Damiano, Paul Davidavage, Carlos DeAngelo, Jack McFarland, Tim Ryan, Mark Santo, Mike Sema, Dave Shober, Pete Stanakis, Mark Stelmack and Chuck Tinninis.

"When I graduated from college, I went back to Marian Catholic as a teacher and a coach for a couple of years until I applied for a special agent position with the FBI and DEA," said McFarland, who helped organize the reunion. "I was a DEA agent for 32 years. I had a mandatory retirement in 2018."

The original location for the reunion was Chantilly's in Barnesville, owned by Bates, but with the renovation and reopening of the ballroom, it was moved to that location, which is co-owned by Bates.

McFarland said after their 40th-year class reunion was canceled last October,



he and Paul Davidavage spoke over Thanksgiving and came up with the idea of having their own 42nd football reunion.

"We called five of the guys and they loved the idea, and called the rest and they loved it. They all said let's do this thing," he said.

McFarland said the reunion idea fit because those involved were good friends in their playing days.

"We were a very tight-knit group back in the day," he said. "We just had that powerful of a team. We just lost to Pottsville and Panther Valley that year. We had them beat, but we fell short. It was a group of players who were student-athletes and also people who cared about each other."

Prior to the reunion, Stanakis said he was looking forward to it.

"We never had anything before. This is a nice thing we're going to do," he said. "I haven't seen a lot of those guys for a long time. I've probably seen only about five of them since I graduated in 1980."

Stanakis said Stan Dakosty took over as football coach in 1977, and he was part of the team that gave him his first three winning seasons.

"In our sophomore year, he went 6-5,

junior year it was 6-4-1 and our senior year we were 9-2," Stanakis said.

He noted the losses to Pottsville and Panther Valley, the latter of which he recalls being ranked fifth in the state at that time.

"We lost to them by a touchdown. And even with a 9-2 record, we didn't make the playoffs," he said. "The conference had that screwy point system. We came in second place to Minersville that year. We knew we were better than them. Well, if you don't think you're good, you shouldn't be playing. And Pottsville was the only one that year that shut us out."

Stanakis said the team did well with its running game, only throwing the football about four or five times a game.

"We let everybody know that we played smash-mouth football," he said.

There was a great sense of camaraderie among the players on and off the field, which also made the '79 team special.

"We were like a band of brothers. We really were," Stanakis said. "We were together all the time. We got along. There wasn't any player that disliked another. There was nothing like that. And we just liked to play football. Stan was a great coach. We were just good friends."

The team also signed a football and auctioned it off, with the \$200 raised donated to the current Marian Colts football team through Dakosty, the current coach who was also head coach in 1979.

Looking back, McFarland said, "That year, we had 60 to 65 players dress for a football game and that didn't even include the freshmen. I'm trying to give a tribute to the '79 seniors. We battled all of our years together. We're a very special group."
