MICHAEL BRENNAN, CLASS OF 2006, IS OUR NEW HEAD OF SCHOOL



The Marian Catholic Alumni Association proudly joins the school's administration and board of directors in welcoming Michael Brennan as our next Head of School.

His selection to succeed the Rev. Allen Hoffa, who has been serving in this position on a temporary basis through the end of the school year, was announced in March.

Brennan is no stranger to Marian Catholic, having graduated in 2006. Since the completion of his collegiate studies, he has been an assistant boys' basketball coach under Head Coach John Paton for the past 11 years. His appointment begins July 1.

Brennan is currently a special education teacher in the Palmerton Area High School, where he also served as the principal intern/practicum during the 2019-20 school year. Prior to that, he was a learning support teacher at Panther Valley Elementary School in Nesquehoning.

"It is certainly a dream come true type of job for me," he said. "As someone who has been around education their entire life, being a principal or supervisor was always something I have strived to be. I told my wife, Ashley, from the beginning of our relationship that the only place I would leave a public school pension and retirement system for was Marian Catholic."

Brennan brings with his experience a great understanding of the Marian family and community, and being in Colt Country is certainly something he will cherish. "It is home to me, and I want it to be home for our two sons (Lucas and Noah), and for many generations to come," he said.

"It is certainly a job that will be very time consuming and very challenging, but I am excited to lead Marian Catholic into the next generation of Colts and Fillies."

Brennan said his goals include continuing momentum established this year and in years past.

"We'll continue to work to increase enrollment," he said. "The school has done a great job with that since September. I plan to work with the advancement department and finance department to make sure Marian is in good hands for current and future students."


He furthered, "My vision for Marian Catholic is multi-tiered. First and foremost, I want to continue the momentum that has been established by Father Hoffa and his leadership team over the past year. It is a very powerful thing to watch the Marian Family come together during this time of COVID-19, and Father Hoffa has done a tremendous job infusing energy and structure into our school, which I will most certainly continue.

"Secondly, I, along with my administrative team will continue to work to move Marian Catholic forward to adapt to new technologies, programs, and trends in all areas of the school, including but not limited to campus ministry, academics, fine arts, facilities, and athletics."

Brennan said he has strong beliefs in the Marian tradition. "It is second to none, in my opinion, but in order for our tradition to be honored properly, we must adapt our traditions to meet some of the needs of students in 2021 and beyond. We will continue in the immediate future to expand our campus ministry and fine arts programs, and establish them further as critical parts of our faith and family based education.

"Finally, our administrative team will continue to work to provide students the services they need no matter what the interest may be. We will always look to add programs and make facility upgrades that are of benefit to our students, and that can help welcome more and more students into the Marian Family."

‘CELEBRATION OF A LIVING LEGEND’ HONORING JACK MALARKEY SCHEDULED FOR APRIL 30



Plans are underway to honor retired Marian Catholic High School Principal John P. Malarkey at a reception on Friday night, April 30, at Marian Catholic High School.

Dubbed “The Celebration of a Living Legend,” the reception will

be a continuance of the November 2, 2020, event when Father Allen Hoffa, Head of School at Marian, announced that morning the naming of the school’s historic gymnasium, the John P. “Jack” Malarkey Gymnasium.

“All successful institutions have people who are pillars of their foundation and giants endeared to the heart of many. For Marian Catholic, Jack Malarkey is an icon, pillar, giant and friend. As teacher, vice principal, principal, booster, parent and grandparent, Jack has been an integral part of the fabric and family that is Marian Catholic,” Father Hoffa said.

Jack is a 1951 graduate of Saint Jerome’s High School, one the four predecessor high schools of Marian, and is the parent of three MCHS graduates (John ’83, Jim ’84 and Joseph ’95) and the grandfather of three Marian graduates (Ryan ’16, Rhiannon ’19 and John ’21).

Proceeds from the reception will bring some needed improvements to “Jack’s House,” focused on gymnasium renovations and the ability for future students to receive a Catholic and Marian education. The goal of this initiative is to raise at least \$150,000 for the gymnasium renovation and to establish a full-endowed scholarship in the name of Jack and his wife, Jane.

“The gymnasium renovation prioritizes the removal and replacement of the original bleachers with state of the art and safe bleachers, updating of the historic championship banners with new vinyl banners that tell our story, and other structural elements that will help the John P. “Jack” Malarkey Gymnasium SHINE! Once we have reached the goal amount for the gymnasium renovation, the additional funds collected will be used to establish the John and Jane Malarkey Scholarship Fund at Marian Catholic High School,” said Patrick Reilly, president of the

Marian Catholic High School Board of Directors and a member of the planning committee.

The reception will give the many people who love Jack and have been affected by his life at Marian Catholic the opportunity to say, “Thank You,” said Bill O’Gurek ’73, chairman of the school’s growing Alumni Association.

Former Principal Rev. Msgr. Edward J. Sacks and former Vice Principal Rev. Joseph T. Whalen are serving as Honorary Reception Chairs for the event, both having served when Jack Malarkey was Vice Principal and Principal, respectively.


CELEBRATED WITH THEIR COACH

FORMER COLT SWIMMER QUALIFIES FOR NCAA COMPETITION

Danny Berlitz, a Marian graduate and four-time Times News Swimmer of the Year, will compete in two events at the NCAA Swimming Championships.

The University of Michigan sophomore finished second in the 400 Individual Medley at the Big Ten meet to qualify in that event. Berlitz posted a time of 3:41.45 to punch his ticket to the NAAs. The time was also the 10th fastest in school history. He is seeded 10th in the NAAs, which will be held from March 24-27 in Greensboro, NC.

Berlitz was also a member of the winning 800-yard freestyle relay at the Big Ten championships. The foursome finished in a time of 6:13.00, with Berlitz's split at 1:33.71. The relay team will be ranked seventh at the NAAs.



In addition to those accomplishments, the former high school standout also placed seventh in the 1,650 freestyle (15:03.97) and ninth in the 200 IM (1:44.15) at the Big Ten meet.

His performance earned him a spot on the All-Big Ten First Team.
